

Character Values Termly Newsletter

What is character education and how is it delivered?

Character Education is a key part of the curriculum within the Inspire Federation. We have six character values at Four Elms: Aspiration, independence, perseverance, compassion, respect and community. One core value is taught each term to allow sufficient time for the specific knowledge and skills to be fully embedded. This character education, and the knowledge and skills that children develop each year, enable children to become well-rounded individuals with the ability to use their strength of character to be successful both in school and beyond.

At the beginning of each term, the focus character value is taught within the classroom learning experience. It is then subsequently referred to throughout the remainder of the term including through classroom learning experiences, assemblies, lunchtimes and school visits. Pupils also develop their understanding of the character value through books, real life examples and role play. In addition, we model the value ourselves and notice when the pupils are displaying it. The more exemplification that children are exposed to, in school and outside, they more likely they are to develop the character value.

Character value of the term:



Having **respect** is to positively affect the worth of people, objects and environments with an awareness of the impact of our words and actions, despite contrasting opinions. **Respect** should be shown with integrity and meaning, which in turn builds trust and well-being.

What is being taught in each year group?

Although the character value across the school is respect this term, this is broken down into different learning for each class to ensure that children continue to make progress in their character education.

In Class 1, children will learn what manners are and how to show them.

In Class 2, children will learn that we are all equal and have the same rights.

In Class 3, Children will learn behaviours which are respectful. They will be able to show these and recognise them in others.

In Class 4, children will be able to listen to others and acknowledge what they are saying, even if they don't agree.

Supporting your child at home

It is important that pupils have the opportunity to develop and transfer their developing respect to all situations, and not merely see it as something that is important to demonstrate only in school. As part of your child's homework, their teacher will be asking the children to comment on if they have been able to identify where they have shown respect within an out of school context. Pupils can write or send in a short video explaining what their respectful acts have been. This could be lending a helping hand or listening ear, looking after the property of another person or being willing to evolve and admit mistakes.

We would like to compile a whole school video of children demonstrating respect and showing what they have done to be even more respectful. Over the course of the term, if you take a photo or video of your child demonstrating or reflecting upon a respectful act, we would love to see them! We do however appreciate that most respectful acts are not planned, and therefore you may be unable to capture it. In which case, sending a video of your child explaining what they did would be lovely!
