<u>Vocabulary</u>	
Shift the mood	A technique in which the tone or mood in a piece of writing is changed in order to define characters or make the story more interesting, engaging, and effective
Building tension	Keeping the reader on the edge of their seat –making the reader feel anxious
perspective	The way you see something. Different people might see the same events differently according to their viewpoint and beliefs
foreboding	A technique in which suggestions or warnings about events to come are dropped or planted into the story.
formal language	Formal language is characterised by the use of standard English, more complex sentence structures, infrequent use of personal pronouns and lack of colloquial or slang terms
informal language	Informal speech is casual and relaxed. It may include slang, contractions and colloquial phrases

Key facts

Charles Dickens

- When Charles was just 12 years old, his father was sent to debtors' prison, and Charles had to work in a shoe polish factory to help support his family. This experience greatly influenced his writing later in life.
- Charles Dickens is considered one of the greatest writers in the English language. His works continue to be read and studied in schools all over the world, and his influence on literature and social issues is still felt today.

Oliver Twist

- Oliver Twist is a famous novel written by Charles Dickens. He wrote it in 1837 and it was published in serial form, which means it was released in parts in a magazine before being published as a complete book.
- Throughout the story, we see themes of kindness and justice. Even though Oliver faces many challenges, there are also people who help him along the way and fight for what's right.
